Dear SACHI Members,

SACHI completes its twenty-third financial year on September 30, 2020. It has been a year of unexpected challenges and surprises. While we have been in the grips of a historic pandemic, local wildfires and social activism, we remain inspired and encouraged by our communities that persistently stand by each other. During these times, we cannot be more grateful for your support as we look forward to brighter days ahead.

Given the current public health guidelines, we adapted our live events to a virtual platform and hosted a series of successful, well-attended webinars. The first webinar was a live virtual tour of the Phoenix Art Museum's exhibition *India: Fashion's Muse.* The audience was treated to a walkthrough of the exhibition by curator Helen Jean, who highlighted key garments and the influence of Indian styles on Western fashion design, particularly the Indian *sari*. We expanded our geographical horizons and invited Dr. Arshiya Lokhandwala, art-historian and curator, to speak to us from Mumbai, India on contemporary Indian art. Dr. Lokhandwala focused on the work of six major artists and emphasized their use of both traditional Indian materials and modern media to masterfully weave contemporary themes of politics, religion, social and gender issues. A lively Q&A session followed each webinar to encourage audience inclusion, even as we gathered physically apart.

Last November, at SACHI's Annual Event 2019, we welcomed Shanay Jhaveri, Assistant Curator, South Asian Modern and Contemporary Art at The Metropolitan Museum of Art, New York. Shanay Jhaveri spoke to us about the larger intellectual issues and the challenges of curating and collecting South Asian art in the 21st century. He described his recent commission *Huma Bhabha: We Come in Peace*; the exhibition *Ranjani Shettar, Seven Ponds and a Few Raindrops*, and the retrospective *Phenomenal Nature: Mrinalini Mukherjee*, as well as the Met's collection of transnational artists including Zarina Hashmi, Rashid Choudhary and Lala Rukh. His riveting talk was followed by a discussion with Marc Mayer, Assistant Curator of Contemporary Art at the Asian Art Museum. Abby Chen, Head of Contemporary Art and Senior Associate Curator, Asian Art Museum, highlighted the museum's ongoing transformation project and the expansion of its contemporary art galleries.

Frank Ames, distinguished scholar and author on rare textiles and carpets, led us on a visual journey through the history of the legendary Kashmir shawl from the early Mughal period to the Sikh imperial era of Maharaja Runjit Singh. He explained the artistic expressions that emerged as a result of contemporary social and religious influences, and the symbolism of these designs that continue to be used today. The illuminating talk was followed by a special treat. An intimate group of SACHI participants were able to view the Kashmir shawl collection of local Bay Area collector, Joan Hart. This major collection spans the 17th to 20th century and includes shawls

from the Mughal period as well as those from the Afghan, Sikh and Dogra rules of Kashmir. It was a rare opportunity to see, touch and learn about the origin of these masterpieces.

SACHI participated in the Gandhi-King International Conference at Stanford University, "The Uplift of All: Gandhi, King, and the Global Struggle for Freedom & Justice", by supporting textile artist Shelly Jyoti's art display. The stunning artworks, created by *Ajrakh* printing and dying on *khadi* fabric, are inspired by Gandhian principles and ideology for creating moral societies through peaceful collective action. Shelly Jyoti uses fish as motives in these works to represent trillions of tiny fish collaborating to displace bodies of water and create oceanic currents, waves and turbulence.

SACHI was delighted to support the multi-day Kathakali drama performances co-presented by the Paul Dresher Ensemble and Graeme Vanderstoel, as well as the 3rd i South Asian Film Festival in San Francisco. SACHI also co-presented a webinar by Anna Schultz, Associate Professor of Music at the University of Chicago, on Marathi songs written by Jewish women from the Bene-Israeli Jewish community of Mumbai (Bombay). Dr. Schultz described the centuries-old cross-cultural influences, showing, for instance, how a devotional song written on the Hindu god Krishna would be adapted to one dedicated to the biblical Joseph. These songs remain preserved in the 20th century personal diaries of a dwindling population.

We look forward with great enthusiasm to scholar Kay Talwar speaking to us on Nathdwara paintings on October 4, 2020. Her illustrated talk, *Making the Desert Bloom: Paintings of Nathdwara*, will introduce the history and philosophy of a devotional sect, the Pushtimarg, which inspired a distinctive tradition of paintings in adoration of Krishna.

SACHI programming continues to celebrate the vast landscape of Indian art, including modern, contemporary and traditional visual arts. We hope you have enjoyed our programs and webinars this year.
